Whereas, La Paz has been experiencing a natural disaster almost every year;

Whereas, in order to instill awareness and preparedness to the entire populace at all times before, during and after the occurrence of calamities/disasters, there is a need to create the Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council;

Now, therefore, I AMBROSIO O. LIM, Municipal Mayor of La Paz, Agusan del Sur, by virtue of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby order ;

Section 2. Functions: The Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction & Management Council shall have the following functions:

- A. Approve, monitor and evaluate the implementation of the Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction & Management Plan and regularly review and test the plan consistent with other national and local planning programs;
- B. Ensure the integration of disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation into local development plans, programs and budgets as a strategy in sustainable development and poverty reduction;
- C. Recommend the implementation of forced or preemptive evacuation of local residents, if necessary, and
- D. Convene the council once every three months or as necessary.

Section 3. Mun. Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (MDRRMO).

- A. There shall be established a MDRRMO which shall be responsible for setting the direction, development, implementation and coordination of disaster risk management programs within their territorial jurisdiction.
- B. The MDRRMO shall be under the Office of the Municipal Mayor. The MDRRMOs shall be initially organized and composed of a Disaster Risk Reduction & Management Officer to be assisted by three (3) staff responsible for: (1) administrative and training; (2) research and planning: and (3) operations and warning. The MDRRMOs shall organize, train and directly supervise the local emergency response teams and the Accredited Community Disaster Volunteers (ACDVs).
- C. The MDRRMOs shall perform the following functions with impartiality given the emerging challenges brought by disasters of our times:

c.1. Design, program, and coordinate disaster risk reduction and management activities consistent with the National Council's standards and guidelines,

c.2. Facilitate and support risk assessments and contingency planning activities at the local level;

c.3. Consolidate local disaster risk information which includes natural hazards, vulnerabilities, and climate change risks, and maintain a local risk map,

c.4. Organize and conduct training, orientation, and knowledge management activities on disaster risk reduction and management at the local level:

c.5. Operate a multi-hazard early warning system, linked to disaster risk reduction to provide accurate and timely advice to national or local emergency response organizations and to the general public, through diverse mass media, particularly radio, landline communications, and technologies for communication within rural communities:

c.6. Formulate and implement a comprehensive and integrated MDRRM Plan in accordance with the national, regional and provincial framework, and policies on disaster risk reduction in close coordination with the local development councils,

c.7. Prepare and submit to the local sanggunian through the MDRRMC and the LDC the annual NDRRMO Plan and budget, the proposed



programming of the MDRRM Fund, other dedicated disaster risk reduction and management resources, and other regular funding source/s and budgetary support of the MDRRMO;

c.8. Conduct continuous disaster monitoring and mobilize instrumentalities and entities of the LGUs, CSOs, private groups and organized volunteers, to utilize their facilities and resources for the protection and preservation of life and properties during emergencies in accordance with existing policies and procedures;

c.9. Identify, assess and manage the hazards, vulnerabilities and risks that may occur in their locality;

c.10. Disseminate information and raise public awareness about those hazards, vulnerabilities and risks, their nature, effects, early warning signs and counter-measures;

c.11. Identify and implement cost-effective risk reduction measures/strategies;

c.12. Maintain a database of human resource, equipment, directories, and location of critical infrastructures and their capacities such as hospitals and evacuation centers;

c.13. Develop, strengthen and operationalize mechanisms for partnership or networking with private sector, CSOs, and volunteer groups;

c.14. Take all necessary steps on a continuing basis to maintain, provide, or arrange the provision of, or to otherwise make available, suitably trained and competent personnel for effective civil defense and disaster risk reduction and management in its area;

c.15. Organize, train, equip and supervise the local emergency response teams and the ACDVs, ensuring that humanitarian aid workers are equipped with basic skills to assist mothers to breastfeed;

c.16. Respond to and manage the adverse effects of emergencies and carry out recovery activities in the affected area, ensuring that there is an efficient mechanism for immediate delivery of food, shelter and medical supplies for women and children, endeavor to create a special place where internally-displaced mothers can find help with breastfeeding, feed and care for their babies and give support to each other.

c.17. Within its area, promote and raise public awareness of and compliance with this Act and legislative provisions relevant to the purpose of this Act;

c.18. Serve as the secretariat and executive arm of the MDRRMC;

C.19 Coordinate other disaster risk reduction and management activities;

c.20. Establish linkage/network with other LGUs for disaster risk reduction and emergency response purposes;



c.21. Recommend through the MDRRMC the enactment of local ordinances consistent with the requirements of this Act;

c.22 Implement policies, approved plans and programs of the MDRRMC consistent with the policies and guidelines laid down in this Act:

c.23. Establish a Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Operations Center;

c.24. Prepare and submit, through the MDRRMC and the MDC, the report on the utilization of the MDRRM Fund and other dedicated disaster risk reduction and management resources to the local COA, copy furnished the regional director of the OCD and the Local Government Operations Officer of the DILG; and

c.25. Act on other matters that may be authorized by the MDRRMC.

Section 4: Effectivity. This order shall take effect upon approval.

I. Background and Rationale

1.1 Historical Background

The Nomadic Manobos were the first settlers of the area known now as La Paz. The manobos were war like people killings with the other groups and even within the tribe were very common. This culture of killings was stopped sometime in 1856 when Fr. Saturnino Urios, a Spanish missionary reached the area and spread Christianity in the land. With the Christianization of the manobos tribal wars and killings ceased and people settled peacefully. Because of the extraordinary peace the people were enjoying. The area was now known as La Paz. Settlements were expanding, starting the formation of the basic political units, the barrios and later became a municipality.

La Paz's political history started when the declaration of the settlement as a municipal district in 1935. It was President Diosdado Macapagal issued Executive Order No. 147 declaring La Paz as a fourth class municipality composed of 15 barangays in March 31, 1965.

1.2 Geographic Location

The municipality of La Paz is one of the rivertowns of the province of Agusan del Sur. It is bounded on its northern side by the municipalities of San Luis and Talacogon, on its southern side by the municipality of Loreto, on its western side by the province of Bukidnon and on its eastern side by the municipalities of Rosario and Bunawan.

La Paz is located beginning from the corner 1, junction of Patay Umayam and Agusan River. Thence, 66° SW about 16.6 kilometers to corner 2, Mayapis north bank of Umayam River. Following Umayam River upstream in a southwesternly direction on about 22.7 kilometers to corner 3

1.3 Accessibility

La Paz could be reach via various different routes. The convenient route is the Bahbah – Talacogon – La Paz road. This route stretches 64 kilometers of concrete pavement from Bahbah to Talacogon, earth paved road and concrete pavement on some portion from Talacogon – La Paz. Travel time varies depending on the road condition. If the road is well maintain it takes only an average more or less 1 hour. Transportation is mostly by motorcycles locally known as "habal-habal' and a daily trip of PUJ from Butuan City to La Paz and vice versa.

1.4 Land Area/Classification

La Paz has a total land area of 148,112 hectares comprising 15 barangays predominantly classified as forest land as this classification comprises 86.16% of the total land area. Barangay Lydia has the largest area of 56,067.10 hectares. In terms of distance, Kasapa II is the farthest having 38 kilometers away from the Municipal Government followed by Barangay Lydia having 8 kilometers. Barangay Villa Paz is the nearest from the municipal hall with 3 kilometers.

Slope Categories:

Most areas of the Municipality are 100 meters above sea level. It starts in the eastern part, where the urban centers and most of the rural barangays are located. Through the hills in the central part of the mountainous western part where the elevation of the mountain peak is 1000 meters above sea level.

1.7 Landform Classification

There are three broad landform types identified in the municipality. It is recognized based on topographic location, elevation and morphology. These are broad alluvial plain, hills and mountains.

Broad alluvial plain landscape is presented by two physiographic types, the broad and minor alluvial plain. These two consists of unsorted and unconsolidated accumulation of clay, sand, pebbles and angular to rounded gravel size fragment mixed in sandy to clayey matrix of sedimentary and volcanic origin. While the hilly landform includes those areas having crests below 500 meters elevation. Most of this landform is formed by warping, folding and subsequently uplifted by tectonic and volcanic origin. These are mostly soft sedimentary rocks, slightly to severely dissected, easily erodible and give origin to a roll – hill morphology. The mountain landscapes are those areas having a relief of not less than 500 meters. This landform is generally formed by uplift due to tectonic forces which give rise to steep to very steep slopes.

Amount of Rainfall:
The data shows that succeeding years the amount of rainfall is increasing tremendously. In 2008, March recorded the highest rainfall of 925.80 mm reaching its peak. On the following months rainfall starts declining; it ranges from 248.10 to 349.00 mm in the month of April until in the month of June.

Flood Control

The municipality of La Paz is dominantly composed of forestland areas comprises 86.16% of the total land area. The remaining 13.84% comprised the Alienable and Disposable Land. Due to Poor drainage some areas of the municipality are susceptible to flooding particularly on those low-lying areas and areas along major rivers. A flood is a very common identified hazard that the municipality encountered since the last decades. There are actions that the local government is implementing like ordinance on Protecting Watershed Areas.
